## Guild Presents \$65,000 Check to JSO at Close of Season

Each year the Jackson Symphony Guild works diligently to raise funds to benefit the Jackson Symphony Orchestra. On Saturday, April 30, I had the honor of presenting a check in the amount of \$65,000 to the JSO. These funds represent a significant part of the JSO fiscal budget and are critical to the success of the orchestra. Funds raised through the Holiday Ball, Swing into Spring--Not Just Jazz Night and membership dues are used by the JSO to sustain general operations and play a vital role in furthering the JSO commitment community youth and young musicians. Guild funds provide significant scholarship monies for Jackson area students that wish to attend Michigan music camps. Each vear \$3,000 in Guild funds is designated to the JSO with the express purpose of supporting the Jackson Youth Symphony. The Guild has also established the Mary Spring into Music Scholarship Award which is given annually to a Community Music School student who has displayed excellence in their musical achievements. In addition Guild post-concert members act as reception hosts and hostesses, office

help, concert volunteers and serve on committees that organize the Holiday Ball and Swing into Spring-Not Just Jazz Night. The Guild also sponsored Backstage Glimpses the and Afterglow for the April 30 concert. In addition this year we have added a community outreach project entitled Music and Memory with a showing of the movie Alive Inside on August 25 at 6:30 p.m. at the Michigan Theater. This project will raise funds to provide music through purchasing head phones and personalized play lists for those dealing with the effects of Alzheimer's disease. The Guild has grown in stature and strength and is recognized throughout the state as one of the most effective music arts support groups in Michigan and is the envy of many orchestras. Each year peer review panels from the Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs favorably comment on the role the Guild plays in supporting the JSO and their programs. Thank you to all who have worked to make the Jackson Symphony Guild a vital partner of the JSO and the music arts in this community!


# New Name and More Sound, Proved to be the Right Combination for Swing into Spring!

After an eighteen month intensive search, the Jackson Symphony Orchestra Board of Directors is pleased to announce the appointment of Matthew Aubin as the orchestra's new Music Director Designate for the 2016-2017 season, moving into the role of Music Director in the 2017-2018 season. The selection process consisted of six visiting guest conductors performing with the orchestra. evaluation method including both orchestra and audience input, and a selection committee which reviewed the materials and reported to the board. Board Chair Tim Keener remarked, "Jackson and the JSO in particular are fortunate to have someone of Dr. Aubin's skill and experience to take the helm of the orchestra moving forward. "When asked for his reaction to the appointment, Dr. Aubin said "I'm excited and honored to have been appointed Music Director Designate of the Jackson Symphony Orchestra.
